**Works Cited (with revised MLA format)**

**Your separate works cited page should :**

1. List entries **alphabetically**.
2. **Double space between entries and WITHIN (even though it may look funny!)**
3. Use italics for titles of books, periodicals, websites, and other formats. Titles of articles are enclosed in quotation marks.
4. If an entry takes up more than one line, press return after the first line, then **indent 5 spaces**.

**BOOKS: ONE AUTHOR**

YOU NEED:

- ✓ Author, (last name, first name). Title of book( in italics). City of publication: Publisher, date of publication. (2008). Medium of publication consulted Print.

**EXAMPLE:** Collins, Suzanne. *Hunger Games*. New York: Scholastic, Inc., 2008. Print.

**BOOK: TWO AUTHORS**

YOU NEED:

- ✓Authors in the order they are listed in the book: (last name, first name and first name, last name). **Continue with the same information, same order as Book: One Author, above.**

**EXAMPLE:** Moore, Harold G. and Joseph L. Galloway. *We Were Soldiers Once...And Young*. New York: Random House, 1992. Print.

**ENCYCLOPEDIA AND OTHER REFERENCE BOOKS**

YOU NEED:

- ✓Author of article **if available**. "Title of article." Title of Encyclopedia (in italics). Date of edition. Medium of publications consulted. Print.

**EXAMPLE:** McLeese, Don. *The World Book Encyclopedia*. 2009. Print.

**ARTICLE IN A PERIODICAL (MAGAZINE)**

YOU NEED:

- ✓ Author **if available**. "Title of Article." Periodical title (in italics) date: page. Medium of publication consulted. Print.

**EXAMPLE:** Starr, Mark. "Sarah-Dipity!" *Newsweek*. 4 March 2002: 34. Print

**PERSONAL INTERVIEW**

Hall, Muriel. President, Commercial Bank. Personal Interview. 26 Jan 2010.

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Internet

YOU NEED:

✓Name of author, editor, narrator if known. (last name, first name). "Title of Article." Or title of the web site. Web Page (in italics). Publisher or Sponsor of the site (if not available, use *N.p.*), Date on webpage (if nothing is available, use *n.d.*), Medium of publication (Web), Date of access (d mmm yyyy) <URL>

*EXAMPLE:* Riordan, Rick. "Percy's Adventures." *Rick Riordan*. Rick Riordan. 2007. Web. 5 Jan. 2010. <<http://www.rickriordan.com>>

NON-PRINT MATERIALS (Videos, movies, DVD's etc)

- 1) Most non-print entries follow the similar rules as print, EXCEPT begin with the title of movie (in italics), author, director, distributor or producer. Title of movie (in italics).
- 2) If the item is not print-based (like a video, a filmstrip, or a set of slides, then use this bibliographic form:

Producer or Director. *Title*. Format, Place: Distributor, Date."

*Warning: The Media May Be Hazardous to Your Health. Videotape. California: Media Watch, 1986.*"

Periodical contained within an Online Database.

YOU NEED :

✓ Author of Article. "Article Title." *Name of Periodical*, Date Article was Published (D MMM YYYY): Pages. *Name of Database*. Medium of publication (*Web*). Date accessed <Web site address>.

*Example:* Adams, Jim. "The Father of the Revolution." *Junior Scholastic* 04 NOV 2009: 26-29. *Middle Search Plus*. EbscoHost. Web. 5 Jan. 2010 <<http://search.epnet.com>>.

AN ARTICLE FROM AN ONLINE ENCYCLOPEDIA

YOU NEED

- ✓ Author **if available**. "Title of Article." Name of encyclopedia (*Italics*). Name of publisher, date of publication, if available. **Medium of publication (Web)** Date of your visit to the web site. Web site address in angle brackets

*EXAMPLE: Ikram, Salima. "Egypt, Ancient." World Book Student. World Book, 2010. Web. 5 Jan. 2010. <<http://www.worldbookonline.com/student>>*
